Undergraduate Spotlight - Brendan Huang

Brendan Huang is a senior, majoring in Clinical Neuroscience with a minor in Asian Studies. He was raised and has lived in Ashburn, VA his whole life. He started at Virginia Tech in Fall 2019 and plans to graduate in May 2023. He currently works at NeuroRestorative as a nursing assistant. His job tasks may involve giving clients general life support, assisting in daily activities, and observing cognitive performance. Huang's next step in his career is applying to medical school in Fall 2023. He does not have his heart set on a specific career in medicine, but is considering becoming a clinician.

Huang chose Virginia Tech because of its in-state tuition costs. He also enjoyed the campus and how it looked because it seemed very welcoming to him when he toured the campus before attending Virginia Tech. During his time at Virginia Tech, he contributed to the APIDA community by minoring in Asian Studies.

classes because many other students in his classes were not of APIDA descent. Therefore, he was able to share his perspectives with his classmates, who may not have had the same or similar experiences as he had. As an example, Huang recalled an interesting interaction with a professor during his Mandarin I course. In one class, his professor distributed Chinese names to everyone in the class, but did not confer a name to Huang because the professor assumed that he already had a Chinese name, which he did. Overall, it was a memorable interaction because the professor assumed that Huang knew how to do everything because he was of Chinese descent. Also, Huang felt like the professor had feelings of animosity toward him but couldn't understand why.

Huang is intensively involved as a member of Delta Epsilon Mu, which is a prehealth fraternity that promotes philanthropy and education. Additionally, Huang feels that he has had a strong APIDA community since his arrival to Virginia Tech in his first year. The reason is because both his roommates were of APIDA descent, and many of his friends are APIDA as well. This helped him make connections with friends outside of school, and it helped him acclimate to the APIDA community a lot easier. Huang did not run into any compelling issues with the APIDA community because of this strong community he felt.

If he could give one piece of advice to a new student at Virginia Tech, it would be to get involved in organizations. Huang had joined a little bit late, but he would like to have joined more organizations early in his freshman year. In his opinion, this would give students the chance to explore opportunities, especially attending these opportunities with your friends makes it a lot easier or helps you get out of one's comfort zone.

She worked as an Undergraduate Program Assistant in the Pamplin College of Business before working as an Academic Advisor in the College of Engineering. Wilson is currently taking time off from her staff position to complete her Master's degree. Her ideal job after graduation is to return to Academic Advising.

Wilson enjoys Academic Advising because of her deep passion for working with students and the sense of purpose and excitement it provides. While pursuing her Bachelor's degree, she planned to go to graduate school and go into teaching. In fact, her undergraduate studies specifically catered towards teaching Science in middle school and Biology in high school, demonstrating her life-long desire to help others through teaching. Faculty Spotlight - Dr. Vijay Singal and Dr. Manisha Singal

Dr. Vijay Singal received his undergraduate degree in Chemical Engineering, and a Master's degree in Business in India. Before coming to the U.S. to pursue a Ph.D. in Finance at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor, Dr. V. Singal worked for a petroleum exploration and development company in India for 10 years. Upon completion of his doctoral studies, Dr. V. Singal joined Virginia Tech as an Assistant Professor, and has been here ever since with wife, Dr. Manisha Singal. They have two sons, now grown and married, who graduated from Blacksburg High School.

Currently Dr. V. Singal heads the Department of Finance in the Pamplin College of Business and is responsible for all graduate and undergraduate Finance programs, curriculum development, faculty, coordination with alumni, recruiters, and other stakeholders; and all other aspects related to the Department's administration.

He has authored a book on stock market anomalies (See: Beyond the Random Walk: A Guide to Market Anomalies and Low Risk Strategies), and has been featured on television, on radio, and in national print media. Dr. V. Singal enjoys reading, traveling, and playing cards with friends and family.

Dr. Manisha Singal is a Professor in Hospitality Management in the Pamplin College of Business at Virginia Tech. She currently teaches the core class in International Business to Pamplin freshman/sophomore students. Dr. M. Singal received her doctoral degree in Strategic Management from Virginia Tech, and Master's degree in Economics from Eastern Michigan University. Prior to coming to the U.S., she worked for the Reserve Bank of India for 8 years in their Foreign Exchange Department helping formulate and implement policy to maintain India's foreign exchange reserves.

Her research on topics such as corporate social responsibility and its link to financial performance, subsidiary knowledge sharing in multinational corporations, and family business decision-making, have appeared in several toptier hospitality-specific and general management journals. Dr. M. Singal serves as a coordinating editor for IJHM and on several editorial review boards including Journal of Hospitality and Tourism Research and Family Business Review. Her research has won many awards including the Junior Faculty Research Excellence Award in the Pamplin College of Business. Dr. M. Singal enjoys reading, traveling, and gardening when she is not working.

Please find below the responses from Dr. Vijay Singal and Dr. Manisha Singal to a few questions asked of them:

1. What have your experiences at VT been like?

V. Singal – My experience has been generally good. I have completed 30 years at VT and just earned my free parking! Research and teaching are rewarded in the Pamplin College in line with the university mission- and as a Department Head I try my best to protect faculty time for research and reward merit. VT as an institution has grown continuously and is on an ascendant path and although difficult, we have to make sure that the gains of growth and reputation are well distributed amongst the diverse faculty, staff, and students.

M. Singal - Since Vijay was at Virginia Tech, I chose to stay at VT despite having better offers from other schools. I accepted a position in a new field and had to learn a new literature and a different work culture (even though it was the same College), which was difficult. I found support at academic conferences and peers from other disciplines and now collaborate with authors from all around the world. VT is also becoming aware that diversity is a strength and hopefully its initiatives in that area will bear fruit in the near future.

2. How much has the APIDA community impacted your time here at VT? What

V. Singal - The APIDA community has been helpful and has grown over the last many years. Four of six departments in the Pamplin College of Business are headed by faculty of Asian origin, including 3 from the Indian subcontinent. This representation should extend to our student body and top leadership team as well, reflecting the real business world. The APIDA community works more informally and has been a source of friendship and support. The APIDA community has immense opportunity to increase representation, and events to bring this community together can help us all.

- M. Singal Despite our small numbers, my friends in the APIDA and especially the Indian community have been a source of strength and support at all times. Our community is close knit and helpful and I am very happy to be a part of it. There is a slow but growing recognition of APIDA as a distinct group with heterogeneous cultures and needs.
- **3**. How was the transition from an Industrial/Business setting into academia? What motivated both of you to make the change and settle in a small town like Blacksburg?

V. Singal - My job in India included contract negotiations, foreign currency loans, forward contracts, etc. for very large projects. I wanted to learn more about risk management, differences in interest rates, and exchange rate movements. Therefore, my purpose in earning a Ph.D. was to learn more to apply to my work so that I could do a better job. After earning my Ph.D., we strongly considered returning to our jobs in India (we were on study leave) but decided to stay back. Our sons were young and we wanted them to have access to more resources without the extreme competition in our home country. Why Blacksburg? We didn't know much about Blacksburg but liked what we had heard. After landing here, we initially thought it was too small and rural, but the town and its people and natural beauty grew on us and we have been living here for 3 decades and consider it our hometown!

M. Singal - I loved my job in India- I was working with the Central Bank like the Federal Reserve and implemented policy governing India's foreign currency reserves. As a spouse, I did not have many opportunities to work in my field in Blacksburg, and also did not want to send my young sons to daycare, so I taught Global Business and Economics at Radford University as a part-time adjunct professor for several years, before finally getting my Ph.D. and then started teaching at VT. I love Blacksburg and the valley and it is now home – I just wish it had a bigger airport with better connections for travel.

Marmol received a B.A. in Political Science in 2020 and is currently based in northern Virginia, where she serves as Staff Aide to School Board Member Karl Frisch.


Anthony Phan

Meet the New ACEC Faculty Fellow - Dr. Theodore Lim
