# **ACE Center's Statement of Purpose**

# Alumni Spotlight- Jaclyn Marmol (2014-2020)

Jaclyn Marmol is a Filipino-American Virginia Tech alumna from northern Virginia. Before graduating in spring 2020, she spent her time at the university building the Asian and American American community through her strong leadership efforts, advocacy, and management skills. Marmol was a part of numerous organizations and roles throughout her time at Virginia Tech. She was a part of the residential leadership community in the Peddrew-Yates dorm hall her freshman year. She also joined the Asian-interest sorority Alpha Kappa Delta Phi her freshman year, and joined the Asian American Student Union (AASU) shortly after. After becoming vice president-external for AASU from 2016 to 2017, she became president a year later, when her social justice and advocacy truly took root. She restructured the council meetings for greater efficiency, launched the internship program, and helped construct the space for the Asian Cultural Engagement Center.



"I did a lot of community searching during my time at Virginia Tech, and that's when I really opened my eyes to the issues that were happening, not just on campus, but on a national landscape as well," she said. "What were the ways I could help?"

Some of her past internships included working for the Organization of Chinese Americans (OCA) National Center, the Asian Pacific American Institute for Congressional Studies (APAICS), and Congressman Mark Takano (CA-41) through the APAICS program. She continues her advocacy role in her current role as a political assistant for End Citizens United, for whom she interned in fall of 2018. Marmol is currently working with them on political expenditure for the upcoming 2020 presidential election.

"Especially in divisive times like this right now, you can't do this alone," she said. "And even though you're not the one being oppressed at that moment, that doesn't exclude you from joining those conversations and doesn't exclude from needing to advocate for other people."

## **Organization Spotlight- AASU**

Welcome to the first AASU constituent organization spotlight! For the first edition, we're going to feature the organization that helps unite many of the APIDA organizations on campus: the Asian American Student Union. Established in the late 90's, AASU at VT was chartered by the university to give representation to the APIDA student community. The establishment of AASU serves a dual purpose-- to act as the uniting umbrella organization amongst the APIDA organizations and to provide a representative voice to the general APIDA student community. AASU has a seat on the most influential governance groups at Virginia Tech. Groups like the Commission on Student Affairs and Student Budget Board include presidents of University Chartered Student Organizations, upper administration members, and faculty. AASU works tirelessly to ensure the APIDA population at VT gets the resources, opportunities, and support they need all with the help of the Asian Cultural Engagement Center. #### **Asian Pacific Islander Desi American Caucus**

#### **BLM Statement from the Caucus**

The Asian Pacific Islander Desi American (APIDA) Caucus of Virginia Tech strongly condemns all forms of systemic racism, racial discrimination, racial injustice, and racist

violence. We grieve the murders of Ahmaud Arbery, Breonna Taylor, George Floyd, Tony McDade, and countless other victims of police brutality. These murders are, yet again, instances of this country's long history of devaluing, dehumanizing, harming, criminalizing, and oppressing Black lives, and come at a time when BIPOC communities are already disproportionately hurting from the COVID-19 pandemic. We support recent and ongoing uprisings in response to police brutality against the Black community, as well as recent policy reforms addressing policing and criminal justice in the United States.

We acknowledge that our APIDA community faces racial discrimination, xenophobic stigmas, and a recent increase in anti-Asian hate crimes due to the COVID-19 pandemic. However, focusing solely on our own pain and feeding into the "model minority myth" falsely pits the APIDA community against the Black community, distracting from the real goal of eradicating this country's racist foundations and institutions. Doing so would also fail to acknowledge multiracial individuals and experiences within the Black and APIDA communities. Ultimately, we recognize that we cannot be bystanders to racial injustice and must unite with, amplify the voices of, and fight for the Black community--as they have often done so for us in the past.

Recent months have also made clear that higher education is not exempt from systemic racism and that much more needs to be done in order to create equitable working, research, and learning environments. As faculty, staff, and graduate students at a public, land grant university, we acknowledge our responsibility to actively address issues of racial discrimination, settler colonialism, implicit bias, gatekeeping, cultural and racial insensitivity, underrepresentation, and inequities in higher education.

As a Caucus we are dedicating the next few months to reexamine our purpose, mission, and objectives. In addition to serving the interests and needs of our APIDA members, we are committed to advancing the issues of BIPOC, underrepresented, and underserved groups at Virginia Tech. We pledge to develop and execute concrete actions within our community, with other marginalized and underserved communities, and with the broader university communities, to dismantle systemic, intergenerational racism through our roles at Virginia Tech.
