

IN 1984, BLACK STUDENT LEADERS FROM THE CLASS OF 1985 PROPOSED THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THE BLACK CULTURAL CENTER (BCC) TO CORRELATE WITH THE INCREASE IN RECRUITMENT OF BLACK STUDENTS. THE BCC OPENED IN 1991 IN 126 SQUIRES STUDENT CENTER. THE BCC IS AN IMPORTANT COMPONENT OF VIRGINIA TECH'S EFFORTS TO CREATE A WELCOMING AND INCLUSIVE CAMPUS. IT IS UTILIZED BY THE CAMPUS COMMUNITY FOR EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS, EXHIBITS, MEETINGS, AND RECEPTIONS. THE BCC INCLUDES COMFORTABLE SPACE FOR COMMUNITY BUILDING AND FOR STUDYING.







There have always been two carnivals in Trinidad and Tobago - the carnival of the privileged and the jamette carnival, each articulating statements about power to oppress, and resistance to that oppression. With this body of work, Leslie Robertson Toney's photographs explore how Trinbagonians fashioned a creative resistance. Her work examines how the artform of mas(querade) represents a harnessing of joy and rage, a condemnation of oppressors and an emphatic statement of resistance.

Leslie Robertson Toney is a doctoral student in Sociology with a concentration in Women's and Gender Studies, at Virginia Tech. Her current work focuses on the lived experiences of young women and girls in the Caribbean, understanding sexual agency, the impact of migration and issues of health inequality. In her scholarship she utilizes Black, transnational and decolonial feminist frameworks, and she has a background in mental health.

Leslie has spent over a decade as a photographer documenting Black culture, festivals and rituals, most notably Trinidad & Tobago carnival and African spiritual traditions. Her work has been published and exhibited. She considers her photographic style to be journalistic or editorial portraiture.

Summary of Program:

Each year the Virginia Tech Carilion School of Medicine accepts two students from groups who are underrepresented in medicine to an Early Identification Program, which provides intensive medical school preparation during two summer sessions. Completing both summers of enrichment and maintaining all program requirements can help a participant become a competitive applicant to medical school.

To be eligible for the program a student must meet the following requirements:

- U.S. Citizenship or Permanent Residency
- Currently enrolled as a sophomore at Virginia State University, Virginia Tech, or Hampton University
- Be in good academic and professional standing
- Demonstrate and maintain a 3.5 g.p.a.
- Have completed 1 year of Biology and 1 year of Chemistry with laboratory
- Express an interest in medicine

LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT & LABOR RECOGNITION

Virginia Tech acknowledges that we live and work on the Tutelo/Monacan People's homeland and we recognize their continued relationships with their lands and waterways. We further acknowledge that legislation and practices like the Morrill Act (1862) enabled the commonwealth of Virginia to finance and found Virginia Tech through the forced removal of Native Nations from their lands, both locally and in western territories.

We understand that honoring Native Peoples without explicit material commitments falls short of our institutional responsibilities. Through sustained, transparent, and meaningful engagement with the Tutelo /Monacan Peoples, and other Native Nations, we commit to changing the trajectory of Virginia Tech's history by increasing Indigenous student, staff, and faculty recruitment and retention, diversifying course offerings, and meeting the growing needs of all Virginia tribes and supporting their sovereignty.

We must also recognize that enslaved Black people generated revenue and resources used to establish Virginia Tech and were prohibited from attending until 1953. Through InclusiveVT, the institutional and individual commitment to Ut Prosim (That I May Serve) in the spirit of community, diversity, and excellence, we commit to advancing a more diverse, equitable, and inclusive community.

The American Indian and Indigenous People's Alliance revised the Virginia Tech land acknowledgement to better reflect historical truths and institutional commitments. The statement also includes a recognition of how the labor of enslaved Black people generated revenue and resources for what is now Virginia Tech.
